

### THE CITIZENSHIP SCHOOL AT NEW HAMPSHIRE COLLEGE

DURHAM, July 12:—Plans were made today for a session next year similar to the citizenship school this week in which for the first time the State College has co-operated with the women of the State. A committee to make the arrangements was appointed consisting of the following representative women in various organizations of the state: Mrs. Thayer, Miss Martha Kimball, Mrs. Mary I. Wood of Portsmouth, Dr. Nason of Dover, Mrs. Vida Chase Webb of Lisbon, Miss Titsworth of Durham, Miss Wendell of Dover, Mrs. Remick of Concord. Two hundred women have been in attendance at the sessions of the school which closed today and Mrs. Mary I. Wood, who has presided predicted that the number would be greatly increased another year, when the women of the state realize that the purpose is to crystallize their thought and to afford an opportunity for consideration before enrolling in a political party.

Assistance for the undertaking from Dartmouth College was pledged by Professor James Richardson, who spoke at the morning and evening sessions. Professor Richardson's topic was national problems, in which he included the League of Nations, federal control versus state rights, reform in the election of a president of the United States, the power of the courts to declare as to the constitutionality of laws. The problem to which he devoted the greatest amount of time was Congress and he recommended radical changes ranging from election of representatives to their procedure when elected. He would do away with the short session, which he characterized as "the don't give a damn session at which defeated men called lame ducks and re-elected men make laws with a disregard for the wishes of the people."

Mrs. Nancy M. Schoonmaker concluded her series of citizenship conferences with a discussion of New Problems in which she said, "Until we make over the world so that women who must work may have a job and a child, a husband and an office we women are not getting our share out of this world."

Women are not entitled to exemption from jury duty, declared Mrs. Meredith of Colorado, who called the attention of the women to their duties in regard to the courts. She said, "We would not have so much crime if there was not so much profit to be made from it. A district attorney is not re-elected because he has mercy and truth and walks justly,

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
