NEW YORK, July 14.—The grand old days when visitors to New York came to see the white lights and left behind them a trail of \$1 to \$10 tips to all who served them are no more. These days it is now agreed among hotel and cafe men, went out with the demise of J. Barleycorn.

"From now on the best we can figure on is a dime, a quarter and occasionally a half dollar," said one of the leading bellhops in New York, who, incidentally, has his own country place out on Long Island, with a garage, touring car and other twentieth century "necessities." "The average bell boy in one of the big hotels has in the past knocked off from \$15 to \$30 a day on good days, but we'll be lucky now if we make \$10 or \$15. On June 30 I collected \$42 in tips; on July 1 my day shrunk to \$15 and I'm afraid that it is going to be considered a good day in the future."

SEYMOUR.—To be poisoned by the German family in whose home he was recruited in the occupied zone along the Rhine, was the fate of William Gillen, Jackson county soldier. Following his death at Fort Harrison, where he was taken for treatment, the cause of the fatal illness was revealed. He was the third son of D. P. Gillen to give his life in the war.

MARION.—Following an agitation of ten years for their purchase, during which time many councilmen have engaged in heated debate, Marion is to have an adequate system of street signs. The city has received a shipment of 1122 signs, which will be placed at street intersections.

INDIANAPOLIS.—In order to encourage all cities to take steps immediately necessary for the control of venereal diseases, the Indiana State Board of Health, in co-operation with the United States Public Health Service, has outlined and is distributing a community program for cities of 10,000 or more population. The program is in the form of a twenty-four page pamphlet which in graphic form is the facts disclosed to the federal government in the present drafting of men for the national army.

MARION.—The cafeteria of the local Y. M. C. A. served more than 3,000 meals during the month of June, according to a report of the secretary. Six thousand meals a month is considered a good record.


