WAR VETERAN A SUICIDE IN HAVEN PARK

E. Gladstone Underwood a Canadian War Veteran Shot Himself Thru the Heart ---Motive and Selection of Park For Deed Not Known

Ewart Gladstone Underwood, a discharged Canadian veteran of the world's war, committed suicide shortly before ten o'clock on Saturday evening in Haven Park, by shooting himself through the heart with a .32 calibre revolver.

Underwood apparently came into the park a few minutes before he committed the deed, as he was found in the gateway over on the Liverymen street side of the park. The flash of the gun and the report was seen by L. W. Sinclair who with his wife was sitting in the park and he at once gave the alarm and word was phoned to the police station.

Officers Hewitt and Deberry went down in the patrol wagon and found the body of Underwood lying face down in the path. He was dead and his arms as Medical Referee G. E. Pender arrived the revolver was found under his body, where he had fallen on it. He had shot himself through the heart and had died instantly.

On the body was found a note asking that his mother, Mrs. Mary Noble of 255 Hillside Avenue, Haverhill, be notified. His discharge paper and about \$150 in money was found in his clothing. His discharged papers showed that he had enlisted in the Canadian Army in 1916 and was discharged May 1919, and he had seen long overseas service. No motive was for the act, and it was evidently premeditated, as shown by the note to his mother.

How long Underwood has been in town or what he came here for the police were unable to find out, apparently he had no friends here and as far as known had not been here very long.

The body was turned over to Undertaker J. Verne Wood and Sunday forenoon his brother-in-law came here from Haverhill and identified the body and made arrangements for his funeral. He knew of no motive for the act, other than he may have been affected by the heat. Preceding his going to the Canadian Army he had been under treatment for a nervous breakdown and the heat may have brought on an attack of the same trouble.
