FEW U. S. GUNS AT WAR FRONT

New York, July 8.—The transports Louisville and Gloucester, Vermont, Grand and Marcellus, respectively, arrived Monday with 141 officers and 1113 troops. These on the Louisville included forward commitment detachments Nos. 22 to 26 inclusive (from north Russia, expeditionary forces). Among the vessels on the Vermont was Maj.-Gen. Ernest Hines, Capt. Ben J. Hain, U. S. N., who was attached to the staff of Admiral Sims, chief of command during the war, returned on the Louisville. "At the close of the war there were only 21 American type guns in operation," said Gen. Hines. "These were made in England from American designs. All the other guns operated by American artillerists were either French or English guns, in both design and manufacture." Gen. Hines, who went to France in charge of artillery of the first army as a lieutenant-general, was later transferred to the second army and later promoted to major-general and made chief of artillery. He wore the Legion of Honor decoration, croix de guerre and palm, Legion Order of St. Maurice and Lazarus and the American distinguished service cross. The transport Edgar P. Jackenbach, from St. Nazaire, brought 35 officers

and 2241 troops. The transport Ontario, from Bordeaux, brought 22 officers, 1558 men, two nurses and three civilians. WHERE ON THE COTCOOK RIVER?
